# **Social Engineering Red Flags**





- I don't recognize the sender's email address as someone I normally communicate with.
- This email is outside my job responsibilities and isn't from someone within the organization.
- This email is **out of character** for someone inside or outside the organization.
- The sender's email address is a **suspicious** domain.
- I don't know the sender personally and neither do people I trust.
- I have no business relationship or past communications with the sender.



## TO:

- The email was sent to others, but I don't know them personally.
- The email was sent to an unusual mix of people. (i.e. people whose last names start with the same letter or a random mix of email addresses)



- Their email contains an embedded hyperlink or attachment.
- The attachment makes no sense with the message and this person doesn't usually send me these attachments.
- The attachment has a potentially dangerous file type. (Only .TXT files are safe)

## SUBJECT:

- The subject line is irrelevant to the message and doesn't match its content.
- The message is a reply to something that was never requested.

Date: Thursday September 1, 09:13pm

Subject: My money got stolen

Hi, I took a trip to Tokyo and all of my stuf was stolen. I don't have any money. Could you wire me \$500 via western union? This link goes right to my account so I can get a ticket for home.

I really appreciate your help!

## DATE/TIME:

 The email was sent outside of normal business hours from someone you work with.



- The sender is asking to click on a link to avoid consequences or gain something of value.
- The email has grammatical or spelling errors.
- The request to click a link or attachment makes me feel uncomfortable.
- The email asks me to look at an embarrassing or compromising picture of myself or someone I know.



## HYPERLINKS:

- The hyperlink that displays in the email is different than the one that displays when the mouse is hovered over the link.
- The email contains long hyperlinks with no further information.
- The hyperlink is a known address that is spelled incorrectly. (ex. nbtbamk.com)
